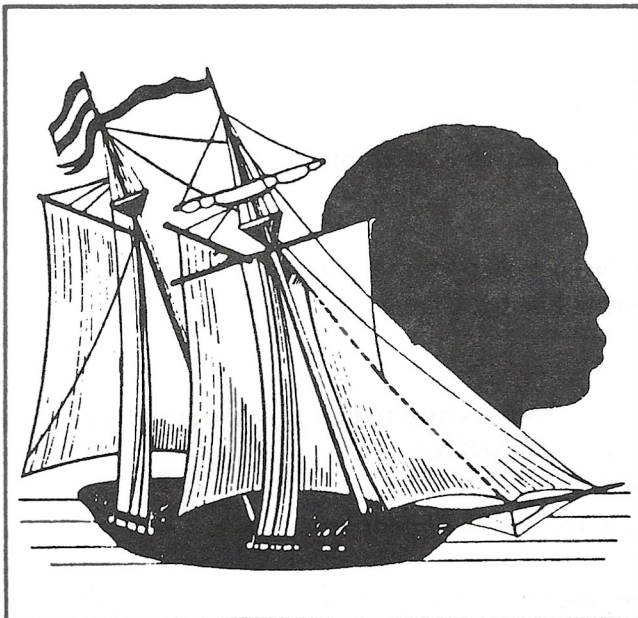

The Amistad Revolt began in June, 1839, when more than 50 Africans were kidnapped from Sierra Leone and taken to Havana, Cuba to be sold into slavery. Led by Cinque, one of the captives, the Africans seized La Amistad, the merchant ship, and ordered the Spanish kidnappers to sail them back to Africa. Attempting to foil the Africans, the slavers set a course for Africa by day but changed the course at night northward toward the United States. Eventually, the Amistad was taken into custody in Long Island Sound, setting the stage for a civil rights battle that centered on New Haven and involved Hartford and Farmington. The case reached the U.S. Supreme Court where former President John Quincy Adams came out of retirement to plead for the freedom of the Africans. In the end, the U. S. Supreme Court upheld the decision of the lower courts that they were free and in the fall of 1841 they returned to Africa. Nationally, the Amistad Revolt was a significant milestone in the long fight to end slavery in America.

TO OUR MEMBERS

Your Board of Directors has been meeting to discuss the serious financial situation and restructuring needs of our Historical Society. Just this past winter our treasury was wiped out due to major repairs on our roof, replacement of the entire back wall, furnace repair and radiator replacement.

NOW MORE THAN EVER, our community needs information on the vast contribution of African-American people - it leads to continual growth and development of all humanity. **NOW MORE THAN EVER**, we are seeking your help during this transitional period. Reinstate your membership today if you are not on the 1992 list. If your membership is up to date and you are not listed, let us know. Any additional contributions will be greatly appreciated.

The Connecticut Afro-American Historical Society is the only one of its kind in our state, and is registered with the National Historical Society and Connecticut League of Historical Societies.

You, **THE MEMBERSHIP**, need to participate more in our activities. How? First, renew your membership **NOW** by paying your dues for 1992. Second, return the questionnaire as soon as possible and let us know what you think. Do not limit yourself to our questions. **ASK** and **ANSWER** your own if the spirit hits you. Just attach a separate sheet of paper.

BEFORE THE QUESTIONNAIRE, HERE'S SOME BACKGROUND ON WHERE WE BELIEVE WE ARE:

1. Our building is deteriorating very rapidly and it is estimated repairs could be as high as \$20,000 to keep it up.
2. The parking at the building is very limited as is the space in the building for doing the Archive work to keep the collection up to date.
3. We have had the luxury of board members weekly working on the collection as well as friends such as **SWITH** of the Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority keeping our doors open to the public on alternate Saturdays. We do not however have any full time staff.

THERE ARE SOME ALTERNATIVES

- A. Stay as we are, raise the money to continually repair our building, which is paid for, and rely on our volunteers to maintain and develop the Society.
- B. Move into the Ethnic Archives Center at Long Wharf where the costs of operations will be the same and we will have the use of exhibition space on a rotating basis with five other historical societies and one-sixth of a part-time Director.
- C. Accept an offer (*only in the talking stage*) from the Yale School of Architecture to tear down our building and rebuild a modern structure on the same property. Estimate is about \$60,000.
- D. Sell the 444 Orchard Street property and do "C" above on another piece of property.
- E. Sell the 444 Orchard Street property and do "B" above. Put the proceeds into the Endowment and use that interest to supplement our operation needs.
