"...they have now taken possession of their new quarters and in a few days people will probably learn that these thirty Africans are not about to murder every inhabitant."

John was a Yale graduate and would be professor of agricultural chemistry. Interesting because the Mendi were granted property in Farmington in order to cultivate and grow their own vegetables, some of which they would bring back with them on their eventual trip back to Sierra Leone.

They invited William Lloyd Garrison to give anti-slavery speeches on their property and frequently distributed the *Charter Oak* newspaper that pushed anti-slavery rhetoric.

Reverend Noah Porter House-

Minister of the First Church of Christ from 1806 to 1866.

Margru of the Amistad Mende lived with the Porter family during her nine month stay in Farmington. She would be the only member of the Mende to return to the U.S. graduating from Oberlin College as a teacher. She would go on to be teach at a mission school in Sierra Leone for the rest of her life.

Notably, Reverend Porter’s daughter is a Miss Sarah Porter and founded the Miss Porters School in 1843. Noah Porter, his son of his same name, would become president of Yale College.
